### 1.1 ABOUT ADEE

The Association for Dental Education in Europe (ADEE) was founded in 1975 as an independent European organisation representing academic dentistry and the community of dental educators. Since then, ADEE has played an important role by enhancing the quality of education, advancing the professional development of dental educators and supporting research in education and training of oral health personnel.

ADEE brings together a broad-based membership across Europe comprised of dental schools, specialist societies and national associations concerned with dental education. ADEE is committed to the advancement of the highest level of health care for all people of Europe through its mission statements.

### 1.3 GOVERNANCE



### 1.3.8 Governance Activity During 2018

The Executive Committee as the body within the Association charged with oversight and management of the activities of ADEE performed a number of specific functions during 2018.

### A: Annual Audit

The ADEE financial year ends 31<sup>st</sup> December. Books of accounts as maintained by the Dublin office were prepared for presentation to the Associations auditors Meagher Moynihan in early January 2019.

A full audit of accounts was performed during late January, early February and a meeting held with the Auditors, ADEE Treasurer and ADEE staff on 25<sup>th</sup> February 2019, this was facilitated using Zoom Video Conferencing.

Initial draft accounts for 2018 were reviewed at this meeting prior to presentation to the Executive meeting of 24<sup>th</sup> April 2019 in Brescia for approval.

### B: EU Transparency Register

The Association's registration with the EU transparency register was updated in February 2018. ADEE's registration number is 224420913440-79.




### 2.1 2018 MEMBERSHIP DATA

New and Emerging Technologies in Dental Education: Resulting from the merging of "Virtual Reality in Dental Education" and "Current and future research needs to assess the effectiveness of video dentistry" the New and Emerging Technologies in Dental Education SIG will explore and discuss how dental academia can best exploit the opportunities of new and emerging technologies.

**Medical and Surgical competences in Dental Education:** Formerly the "General Medicine and Surgery in Dentistry" the SIG will continue to explore best practice in dental education in the area of medical and surgical competences and how they are related to the dental curriculum.

**Global Health and Social Accountability:** Former "Global Health" this expanded SIG will also incorporate discussions on best practice on social accountability and how it applies in dental education and practice.

Aesthetic Dentistry Workgroup Meeting: The worldwide ongoing growth of aesthetic dentistry leads to an increasing demand for this problem and necessitates increasing consideration both in undergraduate and postgraduate level with the aim of defining structured and homogenous curricular contents for developing and performing interdisciplinary treatment strategies. This SIG aims to analyze the current educational status, to define future needs and to purpose educational formats for the university curricula, in addition to the area of Continuing Professional Development.

### 4.0 REPORT ON EUROPEAN ACTIVITIES

### **4.1 EDHF**

During 2018 ADEE has continued to provide expert advice in dental education to the EDHF in their process of developing a common educational framework (CEF) document for dental hygienists across Europe. The draft document, which is based on the format of the ADEE "Profile of Undergraduate Dental Education in Europe" document, was open to Pan-European consultation between May and July and received input from a large number of different stakeholders across Europe.

The CEF document was finalized at a special interest group at the ADEE meeting in Oslo and ultimately adopted by the general assembly of the EDHF in Jerusalem in October. The CEF, which is intended as an inspirational document that can be adapted to local requirements and regulations, is now available for use by dental hygienist educators around Europe.

### 4.2 FEDCAR

President Stéphanie Tubert-Jeannin and Secretary General Cristina Manzanares, in collaboration with Denis Murphy and the ADEE executive members such as Rui Amaral Mendes, participated in advance preparations and attendance at the FEDCAR (Federation of European Dental Competent Authorities and Regulator) annual meeting, in Paris on 30 November 2018.

Prior to the conference, ADEE was asked by FEDCAR (President: David O Flynn, Administrator: Cedric Grolleau) to validate, in conjunction with the CED - Council of European Dentists (Executive/ Education group; Doniphan Hammer) and EDSA (President: Alyette Greiveldinger), a joint statement concerning the principles of Accreditation of dental education in the European Union. The concept was that FEDCAR with ADEE, CED and EDSA call for the European Commission to recognize the need for a better system to ensure a minimum acceptable standard in the quality of dental education in its report on the implementation of Directive 2005/36.

Within this request, President Stephanie Tubert-Jeannin and Secretary General Cristina Manzanares were invited to make an oral presentation on this topic at the FEDCAR meeting. This presentation provided an opportunity to present the ADEE and its activities. The links between dental education and public health issues were discussed. Similarly, the concept of competence and the interest of developing integrated curricula based on a competency-based approach were discussed.

The ADEE's position on updating the European directive and its annex V, which lists the disciplines to be integrated into dental education programs, was also discussed. The Graduating European Dentists (formally the profile of competencies of the European dental graduate), published by the ADEE in 2017, was presented as a basis for the ADEE's request to include a competency-based approach in Annex V of the Directive instead of a list of disciplines.

The history of the construction of the European Higher Education Area was recalled so as to enlighten those not familiar with same. The European accreditation system for universities and higher education programs within the EHEA (European Higher Education Area) was presented, and in particular the positioning of the ADEE within the ENQA (European Quality Assurance Agency). The European Guide for the Accreditation of University programs and institutions (European Standards and Guidelines) used by national accreditation agencies was also presented. The school visit program and the ADEE leader program have been positioned in relation to this framework. Then, the evaluation of the French dental schools by the French agency HCERES was presented. This presentation ended with a discussion on the prospects for collaboration in the field of quality assurance concerning, on the one hand, the integration of a competency-based approach in the directive and its annex, on the other hand, the ways to improve accreditation systems for dental education in Europe.

The ADEE, CED, EDSA, FEDCAR agreed on a common objective that is promoting the quality of dental education, in order to have health professionals in the EU who can take care of the health needs of populations in a safe, effective and professional manner. However, the role of existing accreditation systems in the quality assurance process and how to make them more systematic and effective has been debated without leading to a common agreement.

ADEE supports an improvement of the existing accreditation systems in the EHEA via its position within ENQUA, an integration in the directive+ annex defining dental education in the EU of a competency-based approach, the promotion of a quality assurance approaches on a voluntary basis with the LEADER program or ADEE school visits. For its part, FEDCAR would like to ask for a mandatory system of a public, regular and independent assessment of all institutions providing a qualification in Europe. These different approaches did not allow us to finalize the publication of a joint press release. FEDCAR, ADEE, EDSA and CED continue their discussions and continue to share their respective views in order to find a consensus.

### 4.3 Platform for Better Oral Health in Europe Engagement

ADEE is a founding member of the Platform for Better Oral Health in Europe, whose mission is to improve oral health and enhance cost-effective prevention of oral diseases in Europe.

Within the EU, the socio-economic burden of oral diseases is considerable: they affect the majority of school-aged children and adults and account for 5% of public health spending. Treatment expenditure exceeds that for other diseases, including cancer, heart disease, stroke and dementia. This is disturbing, given that much of the oral disease burden is preventable.

The Platform has held several meetings during 2018, location APCO offices in Brussels, including a meeting with its associated members. Topics that have been discussed include:

- 1. Promoting prevention/preventative care
- 2. Filling the gaps in research
- 3. Harmonizing European dental curricula
- 4. Connecting the dental community throughout Europe

Also, discussions were updating the goals and vision of the Platform in the coming years and what the strategy of the Platform should look like, particularly with regard to the upcoming European elections. Members discussed what policymakers want, particularly a healthier population with a greater quality of life, and how oral health can fit into that narrative.

Finally in 2018, preparations were made to investigate examples of good practices to promote oral health throughout Europe. As was done previously on a smaller scale, in the course of 2019 an analysis will be made of practices that may serve as an inspiration for others in order to achieve better oral health for the population.

### 5.0 REPORT ON INTERNATIONAL ACTIVITIES

### 5.1 American Dental Education Association (ADEA)



Much work and planning has been input into the delivery of the joint ADEA ADEE meeting **Shaping the Future of Dental Education III** to be held in Brescia Italy in April 2019.

Registration opened in mid-November 2018 and a full 2.5 day programme of workshops has been devised. The meeting draws upon

the learning of the 2017 London Meeting and is hoped will attract in the region of 300 delegates to the University of Brescia in Italy. The aim of the meeting is to have detailed and in depth discussions and networking intermixed with keynote presentations and workshop sessions.

# 5.2 International Federation of Dental Educators and Associations (IFDEA)



Members will be aware that during 2017 IFDEA was once again transferred back to be hosted by the ADEE office. Since its relation much work has been invest in many areas so as to enable a meaningful network of dental educators who can have impact where it is most needed.

During late 2018 a new website was developed <a href="www.ifdea.org">www.ifdea.org</a> and so as to better promote the aims of IFDEA a number of collaborations establish. IFDEA launched a campaign to support Visa requests and partial sponsorship of educators from low and lower medium income economies countries wishing to travel to Shaping III. This initiative was sponsored by University of Brescia in order to attract more attendants from countries that usually cannot take part in international meetings concerning dental education. Another economic support came by the International College of Dentists, Philippe Dear Foundation, whose aim is to support education.

### 5.3 International Association for Dental Research (IADR)



ADEE presented a symposium for the first time in many years at the IADR meeting held in the Excel Arena London in June 2018. Attracting over 100 delegates the session shared outcomes from the joint

ADEA/ADEE Shaping the Future of Dental Education Meeting held in London on May 2017. Both ADEA and ADEE leadership were very happy with the attendance and engagement at this session and it is hoped that participation in IADR will continue to grow in the coming years.

# 5.4 Advancing Collaborations with Sister Organisations (ENQA & AMEE)



We are living in a time when Education in Health Sciences call for closer and more meaningful collaborative approaches that may impact the students' holistic comprehension of the patients' needs and expectations, given their specific social, cultural and economic contexts.

As such, it appears to us as pivotal that we commit - now more than ever! - to enhancing the quality of the education, while further promoting the relevance and importance of an integrated and interprofessional approach to education and patient care, transversal to all health professionals.

During 2018 continued two important collaborations:

1. ADEE engagement with AMEE, through its Annual Meeting, and with

2. ENQA, via ENQA's Member Forum and projects such as the LIREQA (which aims to address the linkage between academic recognition and quality assurance), aimed to provide us with the input needed to address the impact of current societal changes in dental education, ranging from the demographics changes associated with an ageing population, to licensing of immigrating professionals and cross-border quality assessment.

The ExCo believes that these sort of collaborations will enable us to expand the consensus needed to overcome our shared weaknesses and often common threats and maximize our strengths and opportunities.



### 6.0 REPORT ON EUROPEAN JOURNAL OF DENTAL EDUCATION (EJDE)

Professor White presented her first report as Editor to the general assembly in Oslo. She advised and updated members on the following:

This year has been a busy one for the journal, with the publication of two supplements, one in December and the other in March. These were: 'The Graduating European Dentist: A New Undergraduate Curriculum Framework' and 'Shaping the Future of Dental Education, A joint ADEE/ADEA partnership, Report of the London meeting, May 2017'. In addition, papers have been allocated to an issue more quickly once they have been accepted. The additional pages are numbered and available online and this has had the benefit of removing the backlog of papers. We continue to be supported by our Editorial Assistant, Lalaine Ciel Losbañes and I would like to thank her for all the work she does.

<u>Submissions:</u> Submissions have fallen slightly compared with last year. The graph below shows decisions made on manuscripts submitted between August 2016 and July 2018. The overall acceptance ratio for the last 6 months is 18.4%, compared with 13.9% for the previous calendar year.



Impact factor: For 2017 the impact factor is 1.343. This is an increase from the previous year's 1.053.

<u>Future developments:</u> The journal become online only from late 2018.

### 8.0 ADVANCING ADEE'S CHARITABLE PURPOSE

ADEE is founded with a core charitable purpose of the advancement of dental education through the promotion of excellent and the fostering of convergence through collaboration. While all ADEE activity is grounded in this principle for 2018 four key aspects are emphasised:

### 8.1 ADEE scholarship

2018 saw the introduction of a new Scholarship stream delivered in partnership with GSK, namely the Advancement of Dentistry in Society Scholarship Award. The aim of the scholarship is to acknowledge and encourage ADEE members (Dental Institutions, Universities and Associations) to document and share aspects of their curriculum that demonstrate excellence in how they:

- incorporate public dental health elements within their curriculum
- encourage students to appreciate aspects such as local and regional health needs, their variations and implications of health economics
- encourage a whole health approach within their curriculum including but not limited to encouraging inter professional care
- include local population needs within their curriculum and encourage students to take a holistic approach to defining and delivering patient care
- ensure health promotion (oral and whole health) is not only encouraged but facilitated through the curriculum and how such activities within the curriculum is impacting on local populations
- encourage an ethos of equity of access within their students practice
- integrate wider oral and public health issues within their curriculum

Following evaluation of applications, awards were made to:



The Outreach programme at the School of Clinical Dentistry at the University of Sheffield: Led by Professor Barry Gibson, this project aims to support the embedding of cutting edge service learning approaches to dentistry in society themes. The funding will enable the recipients to run a series of events with all of fourth and fifth year students, and will fully include them in the development of a new approach to their learning. These events will draw on the methods and techniques of appreciative enquiry. Students will be asked to describe what has gone well in their engaged learning and what could be better. The outcome of this event will raise the profile of the School of Clinical Dentistry engaged learning model, in the student body. It will highlight

the importance of dentistry in society themes as crucial to the practice of dentistry in the real world. The School of Clinical Dentistry, University of Sheffield Outreach Programme will be enhanced to include a series of student led reflective exercises around the role of dental services in addressing inequalities in health, health promotion and health in general.

The Community Engagement Programme at the Peninsula Dental School Faculty Of Medicine And Dentistry, University Of Plymouth: Led by Mr Robert Witton, Peninsula Dental School has developed a reputation for its community engagement education model and has a strong platform for further refinement and evaluation of the approach to dentistry in society. The scholarship will be used to support further qualitative investigation into the lived in experiences of dental students as they undertake IPE and community engagement to understand transformative moments and areas of troublesome learning, and how it influences students understanding of social accountability. The project will align closely with increasing national and



international interest in how medical and dental schools can become more socially engaged. The long term impact will enable a refined learning experiences and reflective processes to maximise student learning, and more precisely identify benefits to local community groups.



As part of the award the recipient are expected to make presentations of their work at ADEE 2019 in Berlin. In presenting the awards on behalf of GSK Mr Mounir Atassi commended both projects for their commitment to the concept of community and societal engagement within their undergraduate programmes and stated he was looking forward to seeing how these projects evolved in the coming months and years.

The ADEE executive is most appreciative of the support of GSK in delivering the Advancement of Dentistry in Society Scholarship.
